




Lecompton Constitution


## 1858 & 1859

- Lincoln Douglass Debates
- Minnesota admitted as a Free State, 1858
- Oregon admitted as Free State, 1859
- Increased pressure on southern leadership
- Radical Abolitionists upset that little has bee accomplished with so many opportunities


## Election of 1860

Lincoln – Republican (Not even on southern state ballots!)

John C. Breckenridge – Southern Democrats

Douglass – Northern Democrats

John Bell – Constitutional Union



Secession:

- Buchanan does nothing
- South Carolina 1<sup>st</sup>:
  - Dec. 20, 1860
- Seven states secede before Lincoln's inauguration in March 1861
